# Syllabus of M.Phil. Programme in Indian Diaspora and Cultural Studies, Centre for Indian Diaspora and Cultural Studies (Modified in 2006)

This course comprises (3+1) four papers in all Paper-I and Paper-II are compulsory while paper-III is optional, the other options of Paper-III will be offered as and when it is feasible. In addition to these papers the candidate will write a dissertation on a topic in consultation with his supervisor. However, the candidates will be permitted to write their dissertation on passing in the first three papers. Paper-I & II are core papers and Paper-III is introduced as a special paper, which will be treated as optional paper as and when other options are introduced.

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#### PAPER-I

History, Culture and Theory: A Case of India

(This paper will consist of five units. Candidates have to attempt one question from one unit.)

## <u>Unit-II</u>

## 1. Indian Philosophical Thoughts and Traditions:

This will contain selections from different schools of Indian Philosophy. This section's objective is to highlight the evolution of multi religious and multi cultural ethos of India. This section will also try to familiarize the students with the nine schools of Indian Philosophy. This section will try to indicate the creative synthesis in Indian Philosophical system with such discrepant tendencies as idealism, materialism, absolutism, relativism, etc.

## 2. Indian Architecture, Sculpture and Music:

Culture is for most part learnt and communicated in its traditional art forms, in its encounters with music, dance, drama, architecture, sculpture, rituals, cinema etc. one of the objectives of the course is to acquaint the students to Indian culture through its traditional art forms. This component would try to give a historical overview of ancient art, architecture, Folklore, Dramatics. The component will give the students an idea as to how these ancient arts, survived the onslaught of various invasions and how they continued to survive during the long colonial period and what is their condition in the post independent, post colonial state.

## 3. Indian Civilization and Culture:

This component will deal with understanding Culture in India, understanding the land and its History, (Harappan civilization, Vedic civilization, Mauraya and Gupta Empires, The coming of the Mughals and the colonial period.) This component will deal with the concepts of family and secularism in the modern, post-colonial Indian state. This component will also try to analyze that unique feature of Indian society called 'caste' from various perspectives dwelling on concepts like Varna and Jati as well.

## Ancient Indian Cultural Theorists / Philosophical Theorists.

This unit will try to familiarize students with some of the noted cultural theorists of ancient India as well as philosophers who wrote about Indian culture and its uniqueness such as:
